David Mackie, an artist, has been appointed to create pubic artwork for the planned housing development off Worts Causeway – known as Eddeva Park/Newbury Farm. A selection of children from Years 5 and 6 at Queen Edith and Year 6 at Queen Emma were chosen to work with him on permanent art feature that will be accommodated on this new development.

Our children have worked with David in creating a legacy to the area, which included consideration about the local history, myths and biodiversity of that particular part of Cambridge. He helped them to bring their ideas to life through drawing images that celebrate the sense of place and character of the area. These drawings were then embossed, creating some pretty impressive art pieces. Alongside this the children created mini art sketch books. You may have noticed some exciting new markings in our Key Stage 2 playground in recent weeks. These have been especially designed to encourage children to be active and we have already seen children (and some adults) enjoying using these, particularly before school! Thanks to a successful application to the 'Learn2Live Well Fund' we were able to purchase these markings using grant funded money.

This has also allowed us to make vital repairs to our Key Stage 2 trim trail. We are now hopeful that our plans for the Key Stage 1 playground equipment to replace the train and station can come to fruition during the October half term. This follows a long procurement procedure that is currently in process, with the support of the PSFA funds to allow us to improve this area.







It is time to say 'bon voyage' to our wonderful Year 6 cohort as they soon head off into the sunset for life at secondary school. We trust that they take with them our values and high expectations and naturally, many happy and fond memories. They ended their year on a high note, seizing new opportunities on their residential to Grafham Water. It has been a pleasure to see how far these children have come and to find out about how they have challenged themselves, using a positive mindset. At Grafham they enjoyed activities such as climbing Jacob's ladder, building rafts with each other, learning to sail and taking part in an archery session. A firm favourite was taking part in the well renowed 'Grafham Challenge'! This opportunity really brought together the team spirit in Year 6, along with skills of resilience and courageousness.















Year 6 certainly went out in style in their humorous performance titled 'What's the Crime Mr Wolf' alongside their peers from Year 5. This later years performance was a perfect example of how our children exercise the 7 habits that we know so well in our school. The audience and judges had to hear evidence from 'the prosecutors' and 'the defence' in this witty tale where 'Mr Wolf' took the stand to explain why he needed to be a carnivore! Our children excelled themselves and each role was acted with such professionalism and confidence. It was remarkable to see how far they have come and how they applied their outside interests within this context. We are so very proud of these children and the mature performance that they were able to deliver. Thank you to our amazing later years staff who ably supported the children to achieve this. We trust that our Year 6 children will spread their wings and fly!


Notices from the Headteacher

Pupil Mobile Phones

For pupils who need to bring a mobile phone to school, please observe and support our policy around this. Pupils are asked to switch off their mobile phones PRIOR to entering the school site i.e. before coming onto the school grounds. All mobiles must then be handed in at the school office before going into classrooms. Mobile phones may be collected by a child or their parent at the end of the school day and may be switched on after leaving the premises. This minimises the risks for children whilst they are in school. Children who are accompanied to and from school have no requirement for a mobile phone in school.

School Uniform

Our children are doing so well with following uniform expectations at the moment, so let's keep up the efforts!

We are aware that towards the end of the year, families can tend to veer away from uniform expectations, however please be reassured that the expectation remains in place for all children.



School Uniform

- Grey skirt, pinafore, trousers or shorts
- Green and white checked summer dress
- Bottle green sweatshirt or cardigan
- · Bottle green or white polo shirt
- Black shoes or black trainers (children in Years 5 and 6 require a pair of black indoor shoes - often plimsolls)
- · White, black or grey socks / tights
- Leggings may be worn instead of tights, but not instead of trousers.
- No jeans please





Jewellery

Jewellery may not be worn in school. The only exceptions are watches, studs for pierced ears, and cultural or religious adornments, which must be removed during lessons involving physical exercise. If such items cannot be removed, the individual is not prepared in an acceptably safe way and cannot continue as is, so must take part in modified activity. The school will not accept responsibility for removing or storing studs. Long hair should be tied back for PE and DT activities.



It is our school uniform policy that school shoes should be black. This includes where the option is taken to wear trainers. More recently we have seen brightly coloured trainers creeping into school. Whilst we are in the final term of the year, the uniform requirements remain in place and your cooperation for maintaining our high standards is appreciated.

Children need plain black shorts, a white t-shirt and plimsolls/trainers. Depending on the weather, children will also need a tracksuit and trainers for outdoor games lessons. Children will continue to arrive in their PE kits, when it is their PE day.





Scooters & Cycles

Please be reminded that scooters and cycles **MUST** be dismounted before entering the school grounds, **by both adults and children**. Please also be reminded that the large vehicle gate at the front of the school is not suitable for pedestrians and cyclists to use. Please use the smaller gate to access the site.

Parking

Please ensure that you continue to think about our children and the community by parking considerately. We liaise regularly with the parking control team and notify them of any concerns we might have. It is not acceptable to park on the zig zag lines or to use the entrance to the school as a drop off point. This creates danger for our families and children. We receive a significant number of emails from upset local residents, informing us of parents/carers who block driveways or park illegally. This takes up a large amount of time to manage, so your co-operation in parking lawfully and mindfully is appreciated.

School Meal Changes

From September, our school catering providers Aspens, will be using a different system to process School Meals orders.

The new Swift system will enable ordering via an app as well as online ordering. Service at lunchtime will be improved with all orders and allergy information being given to the kitchen in real time by way of tablet computers. This change will require payments to be made to the new Swift system, so please run down any credit on your child's existing Select account. Should you have any credit left on your child's account, you will need to contact Select directly who will organise a refund for you.

More details about the new Swift system will be sent home soon.

If your child is currently in Year 2 and moving into Year 3, they will no longer be eligible for universal free school meals. When they return in September you will need to pay £2.75 if your child choses to have a school lunch.

We will return to school on Week 2 of the current menu.

Bumblebee (Nursery)

Children in Bumblebee class have been learning the story of the Very Hungry Caterpillar by Eric Carle. They have made story maps and have made their own group books.

We have shared other stories by Eric Carle and have made caterpillars and butterflies for our classroom display. We have learnt new words and facts about caterpillars and butterflies and have been very excited to observe our own caterpillars turning to butterflies in our nursery!











Dragonfly (R1) & Ladybird (R2)







This term Reception children really enjoyed a visit to the Cambridge Botanical Gardens. We were all very sensible on the coach, looking for familiar sights during the journey. It was such a fun busy morning exploring the gardens and looking at all the amazing plants. During our time at the gardens we used our senses and thought about what we could see, hear and smell. We also looked for the tallest tree, which was enormous!

We enjoyed a nature scavenger hunt, looking for items such as something that could be a fairy's hat and something small and beautiful. We also enjoyed doing a photo hunt, seeing if we could find the places pictured on our photo sheet. Highlights of the day were definitely the coach journey and a special picnic lunch on our return! A big thank you to the parent helpers that made the trip possible!









In Daisy class this half term, we have been learning about money in Maths. We set up our own shops then we enjoyed buying various items using 1,2,5 and 10 pence pieces. We tried to think of as many ways as we could to buy items using different coins. In English we have been learning how to write recounts. We ventured out to the woodland for a leisurely walk and discussed the sounds, sights and scents of the nature around us. Then we collected some natural materials to build homes for woodland creatures. They looked amazing! We are now spending time writing about our adventures.

Iris (1.2)

As part of our 'Under the Sea' topic, Year 1 have enjoyed experimenting with different techniques and materials to produce some wonderful seathermed paintings in Art.

We have also explored the question "How is the birth of a baby celebrated?" We delved into various traditions and celebrations including baptisms in Christianity and Aqiqahs in Islam. We enjoyed visiting St James' Church and seeing a baptism re-enactment in person! We then used all the knowledge we had gained to design our own events to celebrate the birth of a baby.











Sunflower (2.1)





This half term, Year 2 have been busy designing and making their very own butterfly soft toys! Using their newly learned sewing skills, the children joined pieces of felt together with running stitch, added antennae, and carefully stuffed their creations. The children then used their design plans to cut out templates and decorate their butterflies, finishing them off with colourful details stuck on with glue. The finished results were fantastic – we're so proud of how hard everyone worked. Our butterflies have been fluttering proudly around the classroom ever since!

Dandelion (2.2)


The children in Dandelion Class had a great time exploring microhabitats, investigating areas like leaf litter and spaces under logs and making predictions about the minibeasts that might live there. Working with partners, the children designed and built bug hotels to compare two very different environments; the warm, sunny paved courtyard and the dark, damp area under the hedgerow.





Together, they filled their bug hotels with natural materials such as hay, bamboo, sticks, stones, moss, fir cones and leaves to create inviting homes for the minibeasts. Their efforts paid off when they discovered a wide variety of creatures taking up residence, including slugs, beetles, snails, earwigs, spiders, ants and woodlice. This hands-on investigation not only helped the children learn about habitats and biodiversity but also encouraged teamwork, observation and care for the natural world.

This half term, the children in Nightingale Class concluded their study of rocks and soils, which we then presented in our Class Assembly! In English, we wrote a 1st person perspective letter based on a book called The Gardener, and then a creepy poem based on The Sound Collector by Roger McGough. In Maths we have been





linked to our Science unit on Plants, DT has focussed on food and nutrition, to create a tasty locally grown feast (including our own cress!). In Geography we have been learning all about maps and keys, while in PE we've enjoyed getting outside to play rounders!



Robin (3.2)





This half-term Robin class have enjoyed continuing to play the recorder in music and learning about how different religions look after planet Earth and English. The children have enjoyed creating their own version of The Colour Collector, their poetry skills were fantastic. In Maths we worked hard on telling the time, children particularly enjoyed learning about Roman numerals. We have predominantly enjoyed the feast we created in DT. We munched on different locally grown fruits and vegetables, local cheese, delicious apple juice and Mrs Galantini's scrumptious bread. The staff in Robin class are incredibly proud of the children and wish them all the best in Year 4.





Goldfinch (4.1)



This half term, we finished off our Roman Banners and they looked excellent! We had to design our banners based on something that is meaningful to us. We were able to practice different stitches to see which one was best and then we stitched the banners together.

We have also been enjoying some writing based on Robot Animals and trying to convince our audience to buy them. We came up with technical language and talked about what would happen if the Robot Pets were not looked after – some of them may blow up if not taken care of!

Kingfisher (4.2)

Kingfisher Class have been busy putting their skills to the test both inside and outside the classroom! During Sports Day, the children showed great determination and team spirit.

Meanwhile, in Science, we have been exploring the forces of gravity through exciting investigations. We designed and tested parachutes to safely land an egg and built impressive bridges to see how many dictionaries they could hold. It's been a fantastic half term of creativity, resilience, and problem-solving!
